PASTOR'S NOTE

Dear Friends,

Our Yosemite National Park ranger told us we were standing where, in 1940, Ansel Adams took the familiar photograph of a tree growing out of a crevice in the granite face of Sentinel Dome. I later learned a native of Oneonta, Carleton Wilkins, had also stood there, seventy-three years before

Adams, and

photographed the same wind-shaped Jeffrey Pine. In 1977, the 400 year old tree died as a result of severe drought, and in 2003, it finally severed its tie to the earth and fell. Surrounded by the vast panorama of



Yosemite's peaks and valleys, our hiking group stood behind the now prone trunk for a picture of our own.

Hiking the parks of the American West brings a sense of awe for me. When we hiked to a lake below Cathedral Peak, we followed the John Muir trail, and as I looked up at the majestic peak, I could "Amen" what the naturalist wrote after his first ascent: "This I may say is the first time I have been at church in California... In our best times everything turns into religion, all the world seems a church and the mountains altars." [John Muir, "My First Summer in the Sierra"]

When I stand where others have stood, or walk the paths others have taken, I often have a sense of reverence and appreciation for both the place and those who have preceded me. I once served a church where two of my seminary professors had been former pastors, and would feel a connectional presence as I sat in the same pastor's study they used in prior decades.

SCRIPTURE READINGS & THEMES

November 4 (Children's Sabbath - Communion - Troy Children's Chorus)

Ruth 1:1-18; Psalm 146; Hebrews 9:11-14; Mark 12:28-34

Theme: Nurturing Hope, Modeling Inclusiveness Jesus' care for and welcome of children are in the first two Gospel texts. The Psalm gives praise to a God who creates, executes justice, and opens eyes, leading into a Gospel lesson of the greatest commandment. Our challenge is to model this for generations to come, as previous generations have done for us.

November 11

Ruth 3:1-5, 4:13-17; Psalm 127; Hebrews 9:24-28; Mark 12:38-44

Theme: Nurturing Gratitude, Modeling Generosity The dedication of Ruth to Naomi comes from both Ruth's gratitude for being a part of Naomi's family, and models a generosity of time and care for her mother in law that was not required. Jesus' story of the widow's mite shows a generosity not based on a formula or percentage, for she gave everything she had.

November 18

(Thanksgiving Sunday, Stewardship Dedication)

1 Samuel 1:4-20; 1 Samuel 2:1-10; Hebrews 10:11-14 (15-18), 19-25; Mark 13:1-8

Theme: Nurturing Trust, Modeling Thankfulness Thanksgiving Day texts will be used as we celebrate and dedicate our 2013 stewardship efforts. We can model thankfulness by avoiding both the temptation to speak of our scarcity, and the trap of considering our "blessings" as God-bestowed favors.

November 25 (Christ the King Sunday)

2 Samuel 23:1-7; Psalm 132:1-12 (13-18); Revelation 1:4b-8; John 18:33-37

Theme: Sovereignty and Free Will The texts are all related to kingship/sovereignty, which can open the understanding of how we understand God's sovereignty over creation, and where and how free will fits in.


