PASTOR'S NOTE

Dear friends,

Growing up in a predominantly Catholic neighborhood, I came to expect the ashes on the foreheads of my friends as the Lenten season began. Even at my predominantly Jewish high school, Catholic classmates would unashamedly arrive at school with the gray cross of a morning Ash Wednesday mass. Looking back, I now think I viewed those ashes as a mark of separation, a day when you could tell who the Catholic kids were.

In the last few decades, Protestants have reclaimed the power of ritual, including the imposition of ashes on Ash Wednesday. We will do so February 13th, to begin a Lenten season of meditation, reflection, repentance and fasting. Yet, we do so at a time when, as Erskine Clarke has written (Journal for Preachers, vol. XXVII):

"Of all the days on the Christian calendar, Ash Wednesday is perhaps the most un-American....How could those of us who live in the land of the Golden Arches and bulging malls be called on to fast? How could we, with our huge armaments, mortal enemies, and international obligations, be called upon to repent?"

Of course, we observe Ash Wednesday, in part, just because of those realities.

The root of the word "Lent" is in the lengthening of days we associate with the season of Spring. I resist such a Northern Hemisphere bias, in deference to both our Equatorial brothers and sisters for whom days and nights are about equal year-round, and Christian friends in the Southern Hemisphere who observe Lent as days shorten and Autumn beckons. Still, I hold to the importance of setting aside a season for devotion and prayer.

Ideally, we reflect and pray daily, but if only by tradition, Lent invites us to observe a "season" when we are reminded to pause when we are always on the run, reflect when we are always busy "doing," and repent when we have lost our way. To guide you through this season, you may have signed up for one of the daily Lenten devotionals we have ordered. For several years, Lynn and I have used the book, Bread and Wine: Readings for Lent and Easter, with daily readings from a variety of authors. It is now in paperback.

As un-Protestant, or un-American as Ash Wednesday and Lent may have seemed or seem to be, Clarke concluded, "...Ash Wednesday, with its sober reminders of our mortality, is the door to a season when [we] are called to walk...into a Lenten wilderness where God is encountered and we confess our desperate need for God's reconciling love and our utter dependence upon God's redeeming grace." The fact that we enter that wilderness from the resurrection side of the cross gives us added confidence to make the walk and, with the words of the Ash Wednesday Psalm 51, to boldly request God to "Create in me a clean heart, O God, and put a new and right spirit within me."

February 3 - (Communion)

Texts: Jeremiah 1:4-10; Psalm 71:1-6; 1 Corinthians 13:1-13; Luke 4:21-30

Theme: The Risk of Love and Truth

The familiar and endearing "love" chapter of Paul to the church at Corinth is, surprisingly, written to a church with a great deal of dissension, so Paul is encouraging them to "risk" loving as the better way. Jesus amazes people until he "gets personal."

February 10

Texts: Exodus 34:29-35; Psalm 99; 2 Corinthians 3:12-4:2; Luke 9:28-36 [37-43]

Theme: Risking Being Unveiled - Transfiguration

February 13 - Ash Wednesday

Texts: Joel 2:1-2, 12-17; Psalm 51:1-17; II Corinthians 5:20b-6:10; Matthew 6:1-6, 16-21

Theme: Creating Clean Hearts - Preceded by a simple meal, we will remain in Fellowship Hall for our service as we begin the Lenten season of reflection, and our journey with Jesus and his disciples to Jerusalem.

February 17 (First Sunday in Lent)

Texts: Romans 10:8b-13; Luke 4:1-13

Theme: An Opportune Time - the Rev. Ken Applegate will be preaching.

February 24 (Second Sunday in Lent)

Text for this Sunday: The Book of Esther

(Regular lectionary texts: Genesis 15:1-12, 17-18; Psalm 27;

Philippians 3:17-4:1; Luke 13:31-35 or Luke 9:28-36)

Theme: For Such a Time As This - This Sunday coincides with the Jewish festival of Purim, which is based on the story of Esther, a Jewish woman's ability to thwart Haman, who sought to destroy the Jewish people. We will focus both our worship and the intergenerational faith education time on the liberation themes of human struggles, particularly appropriate for African-American History Month, as well as our hosting that weekend of a display of paintings created by refugees of the Iraqi conflict.

BIBLE STUDY - WEDNESDAYS AT 4:00 P.M.

All are invited to attend the weekly Bible study held on Wednesdays at 4:00 p.m. There is no prerequisite of any level of biblical knowledge or study, just an interest in expanding one's understanding of the Scriptures. Each session is also "independent," as we read and discuss the Scripture readings for the upcoming Sunday, with the leader (normally the pastor) offering insights from her or his own study. NOTES: The Bible study on Ash Wednesday, February 13 will focus

on the texts for that day, and lead into the dinner and service in the evening.

Wednesday, February 13 - Ash Wednesday

4:00 p.m.- Bible study.

Our weekly Bible study will focus on the texts for Ash Wednesday: Joel 2:1-2, 12-17; Psalm 51:1-17; Il Corinthians 5:20b-6:10; Matthew 6:1-6, 16-21

While not related to Lent or Passover, Purim often falls during the Lenten season, a Jewish festival that commemorates the deliverance of God's people through the actions of Queen Esther and Mordecai as told in the biblical book of Esther. Highlights of Actions at Stated Session Meeting, Wednesday, January 30, 2013 (postponed from January 28)

- Re-Elected Clerk of Session Susan Steele
- Re-Elected Treasurer Bill Jaffarian
- Approved hosting Albany Presbytery at FUPC on Sat. March 16.
- Elected Peg Drew to chair Nominating Committee.
- Approved endowment draw for 2013 Budget (second reading).
- Authorized Facilities, Finance and Stewardship Committee to apply for inclusion in the Albany Presbytery's Building Assessment Pilot and to advise Session of next steps (if application is accepted).
- Approved making a memorial donation of \$100 (from Church & Society line item) to Joseph's House for Inn from the Cold.
- Session approved proceeds from sale of soup on February 3 to the Lansingburgh Boys and Girls Club.
- Authorized Personnel Committee to hire Administrative Assistant, based on their recommended candidates, if the way be clear.
- Authorized renewal of the interim pastor contract with the Rev. Rick Otty for one year, effective March
 1, 2013, with a 2% increase in salary and housing, and the same transitional provisions as the prior
