# PASTOR'S NOTE IN THIS ISSUE

Dear friends,

I expect your new pastor is going to disappoint you. In fact, I am 98% sure she or he will. And I write this even before the Pastor Nominating Committee indicates it has a candidate to present to you for election as your next pastor.

Here is the other side of the equation. I am also 98% sure you will disappoint your new pastor.

My intent in making these "grinchy" assertions is to remind us of the often subtle expectations we place upon one another within the church family. At times, in interviews with potential administrative assistants, the comment is made that she or he will have 130 "bosses." While offered with a tinge of humor, it is also a lesson for interviewees who may not be familiar with the dynamics of the congregation as a community of 130 individual members. The relationship between pastor and a congregation involves an even more complex set of expectations.

Within our own families and friendships, we also experience such a mutuality of expectations. Parents set expectations of behavior for their children, while children have expectations of their parents as well. We sometimes joke a teen's expectation is for a parent is for him or her to be like their friend's "perfect" parent. Different families have different understandings of when, if ever, parents end the parental role and move into an adult relationship with their grown children. Differing expectations are often at the heart of sibling relationships when it comes to decisions about the care of aging parents. When a family expands to include "in-laws," each adds to the mix her or his own expectations of how a family "should" be. A real difficulty with expectations comes when they are unspoken, as if someone should "just know."

In my years of interim ministry, I have heard stories of both disappointments with and joys about former pastors of the particular congregations. Most often these involve the pastor's skills in preaching, pastoral care, or administration, or simply, friendliness, and how expectations were or were not met in one of these areas. In one congregation, I soon recognized a former pastor, who had died

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# WORSHIP SCHEDULE

Sunday Worship is at 10 am (in July and August, worship begins at 9:30 am, with some Sundays being at another church – please check church calendar for details) suddenly twenty years prior, was still being revered as the dearly beloved, "perfect" pastor. This had not served the next pastor well, and at one point I suggested that "even though your mother may have made the best lasagna, and there is nothing that can take that away, you really don't need to keep reminding your spouse or partner of it."

Expectations focused on a pastor's gifts and skills are tricky, because they often are lodged in the hope someone will be a recreation of a past memory, or a fulfillment of a future dream. It is a set-up for disappointment. One can hear this in phrases such as, "He preaches in a different style than our former pastor." "She would always take care of that for us." "He should have brought new growth by now." "She doesn't seem to understand the urgency."

Pastors also bring expectations, some based on materials provided by, or conversations with a Pastor Nominating Committee, but others carried from a previous congregation. I myself realize I may too often use the phrase, "In a former congregation, ...", and while my intent is to offer an example, I understand it can be heard to imply you should do or be like that church.

Regarding expectations, I would offer the following. First, when we have an expectation of someone, whether a family member or a pastor, it needs to be shared with her or him directly. It can then be mutually determined if the expectation is fair. Second, if an agreed upon expectation is not met, tell the person one on one. Do not share it with someone else and use that person to forward on your concern. Jesus said it this way in Matthew 18: If another member of the church sins against you, go and point out the fault when the two of you are alone.

In a very real sense, I believe there is but one real expectation a congregation and pastor should have for each other: integrity. In fact, is that not what we expect of one another in the church, that we will be fully truthful and honest in our relationship with one another. The fact is, pastors and church members alike are growing disciples, with varied gifts, seeking to serve Christ faithfully within a particular church family. Family life is rarely perfect, and sometimes downright tough, but particularly if we focus less on our expectations for others, it can be really fun and joyful!

Shirley Hinkamp, Copy Editor **June 2** – (9th Sunday in Ordinary Time – Communion) – 10:00 a.m. **Texts:** I Kings 18:20-39; Psalm 96; Galatians 1:1-12; Luke 7:1-10 **Theme:** God Stories We Tell – The amazing account of a sacrifice set afire by Israel's God in I Kings, and Jesus' healing of a centurion's slave from a distance invite us to consider what God stories we are telling in our lives, for at its heart, faith is lodged in story.

June 9 – (10th Sunday in Ordinary Time) – 10:00 a.m.

Texts: I Kings 17:8-24; Psalm 146; Galatians 1:11-24; Luke 7:11-17

Theme: Two Widows, Two Sons, To Life – In our I Kings and Gospel readings, two widows with a gravely ill and dead son are encountered by the prophet Elijah and Jesus. When their health is restored, life is restored for the widows as well.

June 16 – (11th Sunday in Ordinary Time) – 10:00 a.m.

Texts: I Kings 21:1-21a; Psalm 5:1-8; Galatians 2:15-21; Luke 7:36-8:3

Theme: Do You See This Woman? Jesus asks this question when an uninvited guest to a dinner shows him a hospitality his host has not offered. The question is more than an eye test for glasses. The story of Naboth's vineyard in I Kings also challenges us to examine our lenses of power and privilege.

June 23 – (12th Sunday in Ordinary Time) – 10:00 a.m.

Texts: I Kings 19:1-15a; Psalm 42; Galatians 3:23-29; Luke 8:26-39

Theme: Left At the Gate – A depressed Elijah parks himself under a broom tree. Jesus steps off a boat only to be met by a demon possessed man. The church is the haven of welcome for the depressed, the possessed, because, as Paul teaches that in Jesus, the human boundaries of separation are gone.

**June 30** – (13th Sunday in Ordinary Time) – 10:00 a.m. **Texts:** II Kings 2:1-2, 6-14; Psalm 77:1-2,11-20; Galatians 5:1, 13-25; Luke 9:51-62

**Theme:** Preparing to Take Leave – Elijah is about to depart this earth and leave his mantle to Elisha. Jesus makes the turn that will begin his final journey to Jerusalem. Coupled with Paul's fruits of the spirit encouragement to the Galatians, the texts guide our consideration of leave taking and following.

**BIBLE STUDY:** A Bible Study, led by Rick Otty, is held Wednesday afternoons at 4:00 p.m. All are invited to attend. The group is a mixture of "regulars" and those who come sporadically. The group usually meets for a little over an hour to read and discuss the lectionary readings for the upcoming Sunday.

(NOTE: There will be NO Bible Study in July or August.)

Back by popular demand, the bell choir will play again for the first time in a while for the worship service on June 16.


#### Young People's Chorus of Erie
