The Parable of The Parking Lot

Dear friends on the journey,

How many of you remember how awful the church parking lot was not that long ago?

What had once been a few dips in the pavement had turned into the foothills of Mount Everest!

One of the greatest resources of our physical plant had turned into one of our greatest liabilities. We even had one of our staff members break a bone in her foot. Not good!

So we took a deep breath and shelled out the money (thank you, endowment!) to finally fix what was so clearly broken.

The problem was, the parking lot could not simply be repaved.

It had to be excavated.

Our contractors removed pile after pile of dirt in order to determine why so many sink holes had appeared on the surface.

What did they find?

A multitude of air pockets created around the remains of a crumbing foundation left over from whatever previous edifice had occupied that spot.

PASTOR'S NOTE

And we were crumbling right along with it.

In order to repair the parking lot properly, our contractors had to completely remove the remains of the crumbling foundation, fill in the air pockets with fresh dirt, and ensure the new foundation was sufficiently sturdy before they could even begin to start thinking about laying down asphalt and striping their work with lines.

Which is where we have been, as well.

These past four years of ministry together at First United have been all about excavation, removing the crumbling foundations of previous eras, filling in the gaps, and pounding down a stable foundation upon which to build an exciting future.

It has taken a lot longer than we thought it would, the same way the excavation of the parking lot went well beyond the planned time. But our work has been necessary, just as it was for the parking lot.

The good news is that 2018 will bring our metaphorical "laying of the pavement," in the First United parallel of the parking lot story.

Our architect, Barb Nelson, will present her final report of our renovations options at the January 28th annual meeting of the congregation. Upon receiving your feedback, the Building Visionaries will then develop a timeline and funding strategy to present to the session for implementing these recommendations.

My expectation is that the most urgent items – heat, accessibility, bathrooms, and kitchen – will be completed by the end of the year.

In the meantime, the session has been conducting a thorough assessment of our membership rolls, both removing long-time inactive members and encouraging long-time visitors to unite officially with the congregation.

The Branding Team, as well, has been honing in on a new series of symbols to describe our new identity visually.

By the time we say "Happy New Year 2019," my hope is that our FUPC foundation will be even stronger than that of our new parking lot, and that we will be well on our way to building upon the new foundation of our ministry together.






The Session met in Stated Meeting on Tuesday, December 12, 7pm, in the McCarty Room.

- Discussion of Rev. Ted Wright's work in Albany Presbytery as moderator of the Staffing Process Advisory Team
- Approval, with regret, of Louise LaPoint's resignation from session (she has moved out of town to be with her mother this winter)
- Approval, with enthusiasm, of a \$15,000 surplus budget for 2018. (The surplus will likely be used as seed money for renovations.)
- Approval of 3.5% raises for Kirby Kay Clark and Elizabeth Rowell.
- Approval of up to \$500 additional pastor mileage reimbursement for 2017 only.
- Call for the Annual Meeting of the Congregation, Sunday, January 28, immediately following worship. Lunch included.
- Ongoing work of Linda O'Malley and Katy Davis to distill our identity as a congregation into a "brand" with logo, etc.
- Assigning David Hains to work with the Personnel Committee to discern a way forward with our music ministry in the fall of 2018 and beyond
- Electing Dana Parker and Peg Smith (Peg Drew, alternate) as commissioners to the February 10, 2019 Stated Meeting of Albany Presbytery.

Environmental Theme Program Tips for the Month



Turn off your dishwasher's heat dry setting. Open the door as soon as you can after it finishes running and prop it enough to let the dishes air dry.

Buy energy efficient light bulbs.

When getting carry out meals let the restaurant know whether or not you need flatware ("silverware")

Keep liners in your trash cans until they are completely full, remembering that it may not be full when it looks so. Carefully push the trash down to see how much space is taken up by air. Then continue to add trash and "compress" until the bag is completely full

John Kelly, Law Enforcement Coordinator for Saratoga Center for the Family will offer a presentation. The entire community, Ballston Spa area congregations and Albany Presbytery congregations are encouraged to attend.

The Troy Sanctuary Movement will meet again **on January 18th, 6pm at Oakwood Community Center.** Action items include pushing against the Rensselaer County Sheriff's move to implement the 287(g) program and to strategize around sanctuary policies at the city level.

The 287(g) program is a partnership between ICE and local law enforcement created by 1996 immigration reforms. ... Under these agreements local law enforcement agencies enter into an agreement that they will enforce federal immigration laws and receive four weeks of training from immigration officials.

There are two types of programs: task force and jail models. The task force models permits officers to enforce immigration laws while on the ground performing regular duties and the jail house model permits enforcement of immigration laws once an individual is brought into jail for booking.

The program operates to deputize the local officers to do a myriad of tasks typically performed by immigration officials including: access to ICE databases, ability to issue detainers, make arrests (in some cases) based on violations of immigration laws, and complete some immigration forms. Under the task force model, officers have more latitude and many criticize the programs as lacking in oversight by federal agencies.

The General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) has denounced both of the 287 (g) programs as creating a dangerous environment for families and entire communities because they lead to racial profiling as local law enforcement officers enforce immigration laws.
