PASTOR'S NOTE

Dear Friends,

The apples are early this Fall, or at least those that survived. An unusually warm March opened the apple blossoms early; yet, as we have heard, subsequent freezing temperatures devastated many trees' fruit, and New York's apple harvest is expected to be half the norm.

I have yet to call the local farm to see if my favorite apple survived. A cross between a Macintosh and a Jersey Black, this apple was developed in 1923 in Geneva, NY. While most abundantly grown in the Northeast, I discovered it in Pennsylvania in the 1990s and have acquired a bit of an addiction for it from September to November.

When I first went to pick at the nearby farm in the Fall of 2006, I found "my tree" across the road. It was an old, tall tree into which I could climb to claim apples higher than non-climbing pickers could reach. I'd go as often as once a week, and there were always enough apples to pick. Then one year, I was told I could find my apples on new, shorter variety trees planted in another orchard. Fortunately, I was granted special dispensation to visit and pick from my old tree, still standing across the road. The next year, my tree was gone. The farm had completed its change to the more modern, easier-to-care-for, compact trees.

For the past several years, I have accommodated to picking from the shorter trees that cannot be climbed. It is probably better for my personal safety, and unless I take the tractor ride to the new orchard, there is a health benefit in walking farther than just across the road. I will soon check to see if my favorite apple survived, and if the farm is allowing "you pick." If not, I can certainly buy bags of apples, but either way, it will

never be the same as when I had "my tree."

Many remember the church when the large building was full of people, some of whom actually walked across the street to attend. There was a genuine sense of "my church" being a place where one felt at home. There was a secure certainty of place and worship style, and often homogeneity of members' class, politics, and ethnicity. Then, it was noticed that the large building began to feel empty, and became a burden as it was harder and costlier to maintain. New styles of worship emerged, taking stands on justice issues caused divisions, and for some there came the feeling: "my church" is gone. Some departed, others stayed.

Jesus was once challenged as to why his disciples did not follow the fasting rituals of others. His response was this familiar metaphor: "New wine is not put into old wineskins; otherwise, the skins burst, and the wine is spilled, and the skins are destroyed; but new wine is put into fresh wineskins, and so both are preserved." (Matthew 9:17)

Just as I know my old, tall apple tree across the road will never return, so we realize the "my church" we remember with fondness is a memory of a past era. And as perfect as I thought my old tree was, or how wonderful we remember the church of the past, we also know our memories are selective. What I keep in mind is what I savor most is not the kind of tree on which my favorite apple grows, nor whether I actually pick it, but the tartly sweet taste of the Macoun apple. So too, I suspect and hope what we savor most in the church is not building and ritual, but the flavors of our life together as an orchard of faith.

PEACEMAKING OFFERING - October 7th

Each year, on World Communion Sunday, the Presbyterian Church (USA) receives the Peacemaking Offering to support efforts fostering peace and justice, often initiated at the local level. One congregation, committed to ending human trafficking, uses funds to provide shelter to trafficked people in their region. They feel their mission is to care for women who have been placed in situations involving physical and/or mental exploitation and who are in need of the comfort and protection of a healing home to restore the body, mind, and spirit. The congregation's leaders state, "There are shelters, there are group homes, but there's no other place that provides a 'home' for survivors of human trafficking like our program."



Our congregation keeps 25 percent of Peacemaking Offering receipts for peacemaking efforts in our community, and this year the Session has approved our portion be given to the Troy Larger Parish Food Pantry.

SESSION NOTES

Highlights of Actions at Stated Session Meeting, Monday, September 24, 2012

- The Pastor Nominating Committee (PNC) presented the Church Information Form (CIF) for approval by the Session and the presbytery's Committee on Ministry (COM). After reviewing the document and making some suggestions for edits, the session acted to approve the document. The Rev. Thomas Gregg and the Rev. Pam Woodman from the COM also gave approval to post the CIF on the PCUSA web site. The formatting of the document is fresh and interesting, giving a lot of information about the program and theological issues that inform the ministry of the congregation. Please continue in prayer for the PNC as they begin to review Personal Information Forms (PIF) from prospective candidates. It is anticipated the PNC will "host" an adult Faith Education opportunity on a Sunday in November.
- Received a thank-you note from Joseph's House for the towels the congregation provided in July.
- Requested a plan for purchase of new hymnals from the Worship and the Music Committee. The Presbyterian Church (USA) is issuing a new hymnal in 2013. First United has been a test site for some of the new hymns.
- Authorized the Church and Society group to provide Christmas Baskets for some of the clients of the Food Pantry. The Deacons will provide baskets for Thanksgiving.
- Called a congregational meeting for October 28, following worship, to elect officers as required by the Church Bylaws. Please give prayerful consideration to serving as an elder or deacon if the Nominating Committee calls you.
- Designated the local portion of the Peacemaking Offering to the Troy Larger Parish Food Pantry, reviewed the Fall stewardship schedule and reviewed the 2013 Budget process.
- Approved a request from Nathan Parmelee to publicize his Eagle Scout project and to request help from the congregation.

PASTOR NOMINATING COMMITTEE UPDATE

The Pastor Nominating Committee (PNC) has been continuing to meet weekly working on completion of the Church Information Form (CIF) which was approved at the Sept. meeting of Session.

Both Session and representatives of the Presbytery's Committee on Ministry (COM) in attendance were positive about the CIF.

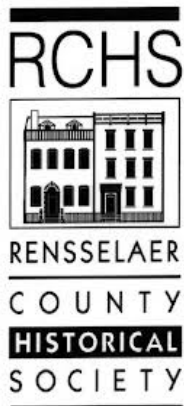
